

Resilience Planning

- Recommend changing the VA Code to align resilience plans with one another and tie planning to funding and outcomes.
 - Include in VA Code a basic framework and direction for planning, and a baseline for funding. Elements in the Code should be kept broad and focus on outcomes, rather than output.
 - Align planning schedules to ensure that each administration is tasked with producing a planning document.
- Within the Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan, pursue the creation of multiple regional plans, expanding beyond the Coastal Resilience Master Plan to cover the remainder of the state with a similarly scoped planning document.
- Upon completion of its statutory requirements, rescope the Coastal TAC to include statewide representation



Locality Readiness for Resilience Planning

- Establish "grant specialist/management" positions for identifying, applying for, and supporting the management of resiliency-related grants for localities.
 - Positions could work closely with or be embedded within PDCs. Consider Virginia DEQ CZM's grants or other states' programs as models.
- Explore state opportunities for the use of RAFT and similar programs and tools, including self- assessment and other resources.
- New CRO Office establishes state goals, metrics, and best practices to define what effective locality readiness for resilience should look like.



Locality Readiness for Resilience Planning (Continued)

- Ensure that state agencies have internal clarity/review of flood resilience opportunities and challenges that will then trickle down through their technical assistance and grants programs.
- Authorize state resiliency programs to administer a set percentage of funds to awardees upfront to alleviate burden of 100% reimbursement for program activities and improvements --- similar to Virginia's Conservation Assistance Program recently administering funds upfront for Hampton Roads to create natural living shorelines
- Conduct vulnerability assessments at the state and local levels to determine needs and inform planning.



Resilience Data and Resources

- The new Office of the CRO should conduct a periodic survey of state agencies and localities to identify their data needs including what data is required to be used and what data is available for use.
- Establish a working group consisting of knowledgeable representatives from recruited organizations informed by the results of an agency survey of resiliency to identify and address data needs and availability.
- Establish a clearinghouse of data needed for resilience planning. Consider opportunities to leverage the Virginia Office of Data Governance and Analytics for this purpose.

CFPF ROUND 4 DRAFT MANUAL

- Round 4 draft CFPF grant manual released for public comment
 - Comments due on August 6th can be <u>submitted</u> <u>here</u> or through <u>VA Regulatory Town Hall</u>
- \$80 million available
 - \$50 million via grants and \$30 million via loans
- Estimated application window: Sept. Nov. 2023, awards announced in December 2023



CFPF ROUND 4 DRAFT MANUAL

CFPF Round 4

Community Flood Preparedness Fund Round 4 – Total Available \$80,000,000*

Category	Amount	Award Type	Notes
Planning & Capacity Building, Studies, and Resilience Projects	\$50,000,000	Grants	Awards require match that varies depending on activity/project type. Reduced match for low-income geographic areas. Total awards per applicant are capped.
Resilience Projects	\$25,000,000	Loans	Below market-rate loans for resilience projects. Awards do not require match. Designed primarily to accommodate large projects that exceed grant caps.
Start-Up Funding	\$5,000,000	Loans	Short term loans to provide up-front funding for activities funded by CFPF grants. Currently, CFPF grants are paid primarily on a reimbursement basis, which is a limiting factor for some localities.

^{*} Total currently available in Fund after June 2023 auction is approx. \$108 million. Anticipated total available funds through Dec 2023 is approx. \$198 million.





RVRF DRAFT MANUAL

- <u>First draft manual</u> for the Resilient Virginia Revolving Fund (RVRF) released for public comment
 - Comments due on August 6th can be <u>submitted</u> <u>here</u> or through <u>VA Regulatory Town Hall</u>
- \$18.5 million available
 - \$13.5 million via loans and \$5 million via grants
- Estimated application window: Sept. Nov. 2023, awards announced in December 2023



RVRF DRAFT MANUAL

RVRF Round 1

Resilient Virginia Revolving Fund Round 1 – Total Available \$18,500,000*

Category	Amount	Award Type	Notes
Non-federal match for federal resilience grants to localities.	\$5,000,000	Loans	Below market-rate loans for localities to use as non-federal match for resilience projects (FMA, HMA, CDBG, BRIC, etc).
Hazard Mitigation of Buildings	\$7,500,000	Loans	Below market-rate loans for projects related to the hazard mitigation of buildings. Awards are for discrete projects that localities wish to support (may be on private property). Satisfies statutory requirement that a portion of the RVRF be set aside for this purpose.
Capitalization for Local Flood Resilience Programs	\$1,000,000	Loans	Interest-only loans to localities with existing revolving funds. Providing interest-only loans allows principal to be revolved within the locality. Loans to localites may be rolled over indefinitely.
Capacity Building for Local Flood Resilience Funding Programs	\$5,000,000	Grants	Grants to localities to support the establishment of Local Flood Resilience Funding Programs. Subject to the approval of DCR, these programs could fund a range of property-scale projects.

^{*} Total capitalization of fund is \$25,000,000; \$5,000,000 has been set aside for FEMA STORM RLF Grant match; \$1,500,000 has been set aside for administrative costs (DCR and VRA).





CFPF & RVRF: OUR CONCERNS

- Existing: Funding existing staff is an ineligible cost
- New: CFM must be employed by locality (contractors do not qualify)
- New: \$5 million grant funding cap for project category per applicant, per award round (CFPF only)
- New: Only localities can hold acquired lands
- New: RVRF outlines that loans will be distributed on a reimbursement schedule

CRMP & VFPMP UPDATES

- Coastal Resilience Master Plan (CRMP) Phase II will be released in December 2024
- Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan (VFPMP)
 released date has been moved up, will now be released
 in December 2025
- After statewide plan is released, DCR will look at developing other regional resilience plans
- Hoping to improve coordination between statewide, regional, and local plans in the future



CRMP & VFPMP UPDATES

Looking Ahead: Multi-Level Plan Integration

Virginia Flood Protection Master Plan Commonwealth Coastal Resilience Master Plan (and other Regional Resilience Master Plans?) Regional ocality-Led, Informed by State Regional Hazard Mitigation Plans or Resilience Plans **PDCs**

Hazard Mitigation Plans, Resilience Plans, Comp Plans Localities

DCR leads and administers the planning process with state agencies and other stakeholders to focus on statewide risk and state policy action informed by regional master plans.

DCR leads and administers a planning process with groups of PDCs to translate contents of PDC and/or local plans into prioritized regional actions and needs for state support.

PDCs and/or localities - cognizant of local conditions, capacities, and priorities - develop detailed flood resilience master plans with support from CFPF and/or incorporate flood resilience in hazard mitigation plans with support from VDEM/FEMA or other local plans (i.e. Comprehensive Plan).





RFPs TO SUPPORT RESILIENCE PLANNING

- DCR will be contracting additional consultants to support resilience planning efforts
- Contracts will be qualifications based, so scope of work will be flexible
- May award multiple contracts
- Anticipated RFP window: July October 2023, award(s) announced in November 2023

- New Elevation Certificate released on July 7th, 2023
 - If you get a "Please Wait" error when trying to download the new EC form, here's a work around:
 - Right click on the Download File link and select "save link as"
 - Save it to your computer
 - Once saved, you should be able to open it.
- No grace period for transitioning to new form
- Highlights on the revisions to the new EC form & guidance on how to determine first floor height
